Hierarchy of Plagiarism

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Historically, layered structure and hierarchy of plagiarism makes it more difficult for us to understand it. In legal terms, plagiarism is the act or an instance of copying or stealing another’s words or ideas and attributing them as one’s own. However, because of the complexity of plagiarism, even scholars may confuse it with copyright infringement.
